


School Days



RURAL SCHOOLS

In 1876 the first rural school in Traverse County was held in the kitchen of the Calvin Terpena home in Windsor Township with Mary O'Neal as teacher. The second term was taught in a log hut on the Benson farm

which had been deserted by some early fur trapper. The teacher's desk was an inverted dry goods box, and the seats for the children were improvised from planks laid across tree stumps. In 1879 the first schoolhouse was built in that vicinity and became District 1. C. T. Havens, a Civil War vet-




Office of Traverse County Superintendent of Schools W. T. Williams, taken around the turn of the century.





eran and the county surveyor, was the teacher.

Teachers of these early schools, usually women, went through many hardships to follow their teaching careers. "Board" in those days meant meals and a place to sleep. Often this meant sleeping with small daughters or the hired girl in freezing bedrooms in a nearby farm home.

The only method of transportation was walking for many miles to and from school. When the teacher arrived at school he or she became the janitor. Among the duties in that area were firing a belly-type stove, cleaning the building as well as the two outdoor toilets and hauling in water if she were lucky enough to have a well near the school. Otherwise water had to be brought from homes.

At the beginning there were no hot

lunches and noon meals were brought from home in syrup or lard pails.

Anna Hartwig Dalziel, a teacher of the early 1900's, gave these insights into rural schools of this era. She stated that discipline was no problem. Children were taught discipline at home and gave no trouble at school. Many of the early schools reminded her of John Greenleaf Whittier's poem, "In School Days":

**"The warping floor, the battered seats
The jackknife's carved initial,"**

Some of the rural teachers completed the eighth grade and proceeded to teach these rural schools. After 1912 some completed one year of high school and one year

of normal training, then passed a state examination.

The steady growth of rural schools in the county increased until 1915 when the last school, District 60, was organized in Taylor Township. These schools continued to operate until 1940 when District 47 closed to join Wheaton District 32. By the year 1966 there were no longer rural schools. The little one-room school gave children living on farms a good basic education. Many proved to be outstanding students. In 1947 Ardell Lupkes, taught by Dorothy Boom in District 38, won the state spelling contest and competed in the national contest in Washington, D.C.

WHEATON PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Wheaton public school system had its beginning in a small frame house built in 1884 near the Joseph Dodds farm. At a school meeting in December of 1885, it was decided to move this building into the village to be used as a schoolhouse until such time as a new building could be erected. In February, 1886, Alfred Setterlund with a crew of men completed the move, and the first school in the village of Wheaton commenced on April 5 with Abbie Kinkade as teacher.

The 1886-1887 school year consisted of two terms of three months each, but the next school year was lengthened to include three terms of three months each. Teachers' wages were set at \$40.00 a month. Some of the pioneer teachers were Miss White,

The village outgrew this first frame building in 1887, and a bigger schoolhouse was built. This first building was later moved to the Traverse County fairgrounds where it was used as a home for the caretaker, remaining there until 1976 when it was replaced by another rural school.

The State of Minnesota passed a law in 1890 that all students between the ages of eight and eighteen must attend school a required number of days.

At the annual school meeting in July, 1892, it was decided to have all three departments of the school open for a full nine months. Also the annual budget was set as follows: Teachers' wages \$1200.00; repairs \$100.00; fuel \$150.00; school furniture \$50.00; erection of an outhouse and fencing \$75.00; interest on bonds \$210.00; and janitor's wages \$75.00.

A Miss Rustad was in charge of a night

school, starting in November of this same year. Reading, especially for foreign-born persons wishing to learn English, book-keeping, arithmetic, and music were taught.

The village was rapidly growing as evidenced by the increase in the school census. In 1893 the enrollment was 70, but by 1898 it had climbed to 259, thereby making a new school building again a necessity. In January, 1899, plans were made for the new building. The main structure was to be 84 feet by 49 feet, with a kindergarten department on the east 40 feet by 36 feet. It was to be two stories and made of red brick, with a basement nine feet high. The main entrance was to be on the west facing Education Street. It was to be erected between the two frame school-houses which were to be removed. This site was near where the present City Hall is

located. The new structure seated 425 students and cost \$15,000.00. Dedication took place January 19, 1900.


One old school building was sold to the Masonic Lodge for \$1,000.00. It was used by the lodge until 1958 when it was razed to make room for a parking lot. The second was sold to the local Spiritualist Society for \$800.00 and was moved to Burke Street, opposite the Presbyterian Church. Later this building became a chicken hatchery, and then a private residence.

In 1898 the first graduating class to leave Wheaton High School consisted of four members: Daisy Cook, Roy Williams, Joseph Dodds, and Fred Dodds, with graduation ceremonies at the courthouse hall.

School authorities were notified by the State Department of Education that the

state aid for each pupil attending the required number of days would be 90 cents for the year 1899.

During the decade from 1900 to 1910 there was a steady increase in the enrollment of students, thereby necessitating the finishing of the third floor as classrooms. Other advancements were the installation of an electric bell system, and the trial use of a Remington typewriter. The high school baseball team closed the season in first place in the state in 1904. The state school apportionment had risen to \$2.20 per pupil.

The school board rented part of the Thorson building in 1910 to be remodeled and used as a gymnasium. The basketball team also used this building for practices.

Believing that it was its duty to adapt itself to the needs of the community, the school agriculture department held short courses for area farmers and boys and girls interested in agriculture. This was started in 1911.

The Normal Training Department was opened in 1911 with twelve teacher trainees enrolled. In 1924 the State Department of Education closed the department for one year because of lack of state funds. It reopened in 1925 and ran until 1948 with classes held on the second floor of the 1916 building. Alice (Stevens) Weickert was the instructor for the years 1925-1939.

Several commercial courses were offered in 1914, such as bookkeeping, penmanship, shorthand, typing, and commercial law. The next year the domestic science department started, serving a noon lunch to pupils who carried their lunches. This was a warm lunch, either soup or a baked dish.


More space was needed for school activities and plans were drawn for an addition to the 1899 building. A favorable vote on the bond issue of \$26,000.00 for construction started the proceedings. The Wheaton school made national news with the construction of its community building in



WHEATON'S NEW COMMUNITY BUILDING

A Source of Pride to Our People and An Institution That Is Attracting Nation-wide Interest

The new Community Building, which is a part of our already well equipped public school system, is practically completed and within a few days will be filled with a busy and happy throng of boys and girls who are being fitted for future usefulness and good citizenship. It will likewise serve the purpose of binding the people of the entire tributary territory in closer bonds of fellowship as it is a place in which all can meet on terms of equality, a place in which all have a common interest, a place that provides comforts and conveniences that the farmer and his family, when in town, can enjoy on an equal footing of freedom with those who live within the corporate limits. The influences arising from this mingling of people in this edifice which stands as a substantial testimonial of existing interest in each others lives and welfare, cannot be other than uplifting and helpful. It is the final step in centralizing and uniting with ties of mutual friendship an entire community in its educational and social affairs and in establishing among the people thereof a better understanding of their duty toward each other in public affairs and in their business relations.

Among the lesser benefits derived from the erection of this building is the widespread distinction it has gained us. The desirability of an institution of this kind has long been recognized. Other communities have discussed it, educators have pictured it as an ideal solution of a vexing problem, but it remained for Wheaton and the districts associated with her to take the initiative and give reality to an approved theory. The new building here is the first of the kind erected in the United States, and it has attracted the interest of educators in all parts of the Union. Inquiries are coming to the school board concerning the building and its purpose in detail. Recently *The Farmer*, the leading agricultural publication in the Northwest, sent a representative here to obtain information and particulars at first hand. In a recent issue of that paper appeared a detailed description of the building so complete that the article is well worth reproducing in full. It will give to all a knowledge of the dimensions and purposes of the different departments and make them realize more fully the importance of the steps they have taken and the value from many standpoints of this beautiful structure that from now on is at their service. The article from *The Farmer* reads as follows:



There is a school building now nearing completion in Western Minnesota that has no equal in the United States, if anywhere in the world. It is more than just a school. It is a city school—country school—headquarters of the County Farm Bureau—office of the county agent—source of personal information on agriculture, domestic science and farm mechanics—home of the city library—rest room for farm women—theatre—convention hall—gymnasium. It is the educational, agricultural, recreational and social center of the school district, of the town, of the surrounding community and of the whole country, if you please.

Did you ever hear of such a school? You didn't, because there is no such school anywhere else to be heard of. It stands alone, a model to all the world, a beam from the dawning of a better day. It is a practical, effective culmination of all the effort to make education useful, to bring country and town together, to cement community ties. And the little town of Wheaton in Traverse County Min-

nesota, has the stupendous honor of building such a school. It all came about in this way: The Industrial Department of the Wheaton High School was rapidly outgrowing its accommodations. New quarters were needed to house the agricultural, mechanical, domestic and business classes. It was taken as a matter of course that these accommodations would be provided by adding an extra story or an annex to the old high school building, but no definite plans were made. Then the community spirit, which was already very much alive in Wheaton, began to assert itself.

Birth of the Community Spirit

In the first place, Traverse County has a very efficient and very active Farm Bureau, organized to promote better agriculture, better business, better homes, and better living. This program includes both town and country, and a very earnest effort has been made to develop better relations between the two. As a result, the community spirit has come to mean something in Wheaton, in neighboring towns and throug-

the surrounding country. In the second place, ten rural school districts are associated with the Wheaton High School, under the "Associated Schools Law." It has been the custom every Friday, to bring in to the high school as many of these rural pupils as cared to come. There, they were given instruction in the various industrial departments; they obtained a glimpse of modern, useful education; they became acquainted with the town pupils; and they were both benefited and pleased thereby. Thus was the helplessness of the town to the country exemplified.

In the third place, the impulse of the community spirit, had been felt in the life of the town itself. The high school teachers conceived the plan of holding a night school one evening each week, and everybody was invited to come. The response was astonishing. A little program followed the school course, and every class had an enormous attendance. Undoubtedly, the craving for knowledge, with which people are becoming more and more possessed, made



the night school desirable; but its enormous popularity can be ascribed only to opportunity presented for social intercourse, so often lacking in a small town. Certainly, the combination of education and sociability proved a most happy one; and the townspeople experienced, without realizing the natural connection of the community center with the school.

Finally, there was one other circumstance which largely influenced the building of this model school. Traverse County is one of sixteen counties affiliated with the West Central Minnesota Development Association. This association has accomplished wonderful things in West Central Minnesota and entertained still more wonderful plans, and among its visions of the future has been a community building—a social and recreational center—in every county. This was merely a plan projected—something to work toward and to hope for, though it might never come to pass.

Now, the man who was president of the West Central Association during its growing years is also president of the Wheaton School Board. He has been the strongest champion of the community-building plan, and it is his particular hobby that community centers should be connected with the school. What more natural than that Frank Murphy and his colleagues on the Board, when the opportunity suddenly presented itself right at home, should see in the proposed new school facility the possible realization of that visionary plan which the larger community had endorsed? The people were already possessed of the spirit—thanks to the Farm Bureau, the associated districts and the night school—and so the project was launched.

The School Board discussed it casually at first. Then earnestly, then enthusiastically. Tentative plans were suggested—discarded—amended—and approved. After much deliberation, the idea was formulated in such shape that it might be submitted for public con-

1916. Articles appeared in **The Ladies Home Journal**, 1919; **The Improvement Bulletin**, 1919, and the **Fargo Forum**. The "Wheaton Idea" for a community school building was designed and planned by the board of education: F. W. Murphy, V. E. Anderson, R. H. Sigford, E. H. Boley, John Lancaster and Superintendent John Palmer.

The new building was three stories high, 60 feet by 130 feet, built of brick, and cost approximately \$35,000.00 fully equipped. It provided room for the Farm Bureau, county agent, ladies' rest room, and a library for town and country. Because of the erection of this community school building, Wheaton was selected as a demonstration community center of the state university.

Another factor leading to the establishment of a community school, the first of its kind in the United States, was the fact that ten rural school districts were associated with the Wheaton district under the State Associated Schools Law. Every Friday as

many students as cared to come were brought to Wheaton where they were given instruction in industrial arts and an opportunity to become acquainted with town children. The community spirit was also encouraged by high school teachers who taught one evening each week. Everyone was invited to attend. The response was instantaneous.

The school used the new building for industrial arts, domestic science, and physical education. It contained an auditorium seating one thousand, a stage, and locker rooms. This building, which was dedicated February 22, 1916, brought town and country into closer touch and cooperation.

The years from 1920 to 1926 saw a decline in enrollment, which led to the elimination of the agricultural, manual training, and some commercial courses to reduce expenses. More classes were eliminated in the commercial department, domestic science, athletics, and music in 1931 because of the depressed economy and

high taxes. The mill rate in 1926 was 27.15, the lowest in the state, and by 1928 was further reduced to 23.80 mills. By July, 1928, the bonded indebtedness of the district had dropped from \$79,500.00 to \$45,000.00 with an interest rate of four percent.

During this era tradition for many years was to close school so students and teachers could attend the Traverse County Fair. The school band preceded the students and teachers as they marched from the school to the fairgrounds on children's day, making the fair a memorable event.

A spring primary class lasting nine weeks for students reaching the age of six years by January 1, 1932, was organized. This class was taught by the teachers' training department. This type of pre-school education was continued until 1967, when a

full year of kindergarten was offered students reaching the age of five by September first. In the 1980's pre-school was offered under the Community Education Act to those children whose parents were willing to pay for it.

In a Wheaton promotion in 1932 Ernsu Lindig took the school band to Fargo, North Dakota, where they performed at the WDAY radio station. The school safety patrol was started in 1933 by the American Legion to control traffic for students' protection. Fifteen boys were installed as charter members. In 1946 the school patrol was resumed after having been dropped during the war years (1941-1945).

In 1936 the National Youth Administration (NYA) and the Work Projects Administration (WPA) provided jobs and funds for 36 students.

In 1939 teachers' salaries ranged from \$877.50 to \$1300.00 a year with the superintendent receiving \$2500.00.

Enrollment throughout the 1930's remained fairly stable.

One way the Wheaton schools participated in the war effort was to collect scrap iron in 1941.

The hot lunch program was established in 1946 for those students living in rural areas, those living too far away to go home at noon, or those in poor health. Cost was 20 cents a meal.

The next year the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) advocated religious training in the schools. The school board concurred, but the State Board of Education said no. Later released time for religious education was instituted with no further problems.


The largest growth of the Wheaton system began with the closing of the rural districts which were annexed to the Wheaton district. Some time during the reorganization process school districts were re-numbered by the state and District 32 became District 803. The increase in enrollment necessitated more space, and plans were made for a new elementary building. At a special election in 1949 a bond issue for \$275,000.00 to build the school was passed. At a special election the voters agreed to

purchase seven acres in the Oscarson Addition for \$6,999.00 as a site. Contracts were let with Swedberg Construction Company as the general contractor. This building was dedicated November 15, 1953, and named the J. E. Pearson Elementary School.

Vocational agriculture was established in 1949 and continued into the 1970's when it was taken out of the school curriculum.

The first school bus was purchased in 1934 for use in transporting students to athletic and music events. This bus was paid for mostly by producing plays. Later Vernon Haugland had a bus running north of town and Ray Fridgen one south of town. Fridgen later operated all the bus lines to transport rural students into Wheaton. Roger Schmidt took over the Fridgen enterprise and is still operating the bus system.

In 1955 school bond issues involving a \$150,000.00 addition to J. E. Pearson Elementary School and a \$235,000.00 expansion of the high school facilities including a new auditorium carried by a seven to one vote. The Pearson addition added five classrooms, a lunch room, and other necessities. Fabel Construction Company was the contractor.

The Edgar M. Olson scholarship was established May 4, 1959, in memory of the late Edgar M. Olson, high school principal. The student council agreed to make an annual contribution of at least \$50.00 and up to \$100.00 to be awarded to a boy or girl enrolled in an education course at a college or university. An additional \$75.00 was to be given if the student were an Eagle Scout and fulfilled the above qualifications.

A class for educable, mentally-handicapped elementary students was established in 1961 as mandated by state law. Later this was expanded to include high school students. Students with learning and behavioral problems were served also with special teachers. Speech and hearing impaired students were given special training. Title I programs to serve students who were below grade level but did not qualify for either special education program were started. In 1982 a daytime activity center for developmentally disabled was started in connection with the schools.


Adult education classes were first started in 1958 with five classes offered. Some type of community education has been offered most years since then.

Under the direction of Jerry Folstrom the vocational department was set up and greatly expanded, especially after the con-


struction of the new high school building in 1974. Many courses in the business field were offered, as well as auto mechanics and wood and metal shop. Mr. Folstrom was responsible for setting up an occupational training program in which local businessmen were enlisted to help with the training. He was also responsible for installing a data processing class in 1968. By 1982 model office, retailing, marketing, and on-the-job training were eliminated because of the cost.

Educational TV was first used in 1966-67 in the fields of science, music and Spanish. Since then the Wheaton Schools have joined the West Central Educational Cooperative Service Unit (ECSU) and through this source and others received video tapes, films, slides and film strips for aids in the classroom.

Following the disastrous April 1, 1972, school fire, students returned to classes a few days later, meeting in churches, the Wheaton Auto building, and the downtown vocational center. By May a \$2,000,000.00 bond issue for a new high school was passed. By March, 1973, bids were let and construction was underway on a 114,000 square foot building located on 125 acres in the southwest corner of town which the school board purchased. The building was

In 1955, with growing enthusiasm for sports in Wheaton and a growing enrollment in schools, voters of the district gave a seven-to-one favorable vote to bond for construction of a new high school auditorium. The building was to cost \$235,000 and would be ready for use during the 1956-57 season. In addition to a gymnasium, the unit also provided a stage for theatre presentations.

completed during the summer and classes began in September.

Extra-curricular activities, clubs, and organizations that offered students opportunities to explore their own interests and become proficient in them probably began with a 1916 military organization. Music has offered students both vocal and instrumental choices, allowing students to compete and win on regional and state levels. Some young people talented in speaking and acting found careers on the stage and in television. Title IX programs gave boys and girls equal opportunity to participate in various classes, sports, and activities. Experience in editing books and newspapers has been gained in producing annuals such as the **Omaka Iyohi** (Sioux words meaning "the time comes again") in 1914 and later named the **Mallard**. The Wheaton **Hi Lite** was started in 1934 and later was renamed the **War Whoop**.

Wheaton athletes have garnered many trophies in district, regional, and state

competition. Some of the athletes have gone on to be considered for playing professional ball. Cheerleaders and pompon girls have enhanced the spirit of competition at athletic contests.

Clubs to foster certain skills were formed, such as Ecology Club, Girls Athletic Association (GAA), German Club, Future Farmers of America (FFA), Future Homemakers of America (FHA), Library Club, Science Club, and many others. Membership in the National Honor Society recognized scholastic ability, leadership and citizenship. A chapter of the American Field Service was organized in 1963 and several foreign exchange students lived here at different times. An active Student Council trained students in governmental operations.

Along with the basic academic training, these extra-curricular activities have produced outstanding American citizens.

Because of declining enrollment and lessened state aid per pupil, the school

board called for a referendum in 1982 to increase the mill levy for school operations, which passed. In 1985 it was necessary to again increase the mill levy. At this time the school board had to reduce teaching and staff positions, cut curriculum offerings and make changes in fees for programs, including the lunch program and some student activities.

The Wheaton Public Schools showed a steady increase in enrollment up to the year 1968 when the opening day of school showed an enrollment of 1,071, the largest in the history of the school. The largest class of 96 seniors graduated in 1979. Since that time there has been a steady decline. By 1985 enrollment had dropped to 563.

+ + +

Ethel Allanson (1878-1956) was a descendant of Joseph Brown, pioneer fur trader and legislator in early Minnesota. She was also a descendant of Sam Brown, founder of Browns Valley, Minnesota. She was a member of Lambda Phi Sigma, Daughters of the Mayflower, and Daughters of the American Revolution.

Miss Allanson graduated from Mankato Teachers College in 1899 and taught eighth grade in Wheaton for thirty years (1905-1935). She then assumed duties as a junior high instructor. She retired in 1945 with forty years in the Wheaton school system. She taught two generations of many Wheaton families and will long be remembered for her dedication to her career.

+ + +

J. E. Pearson (1884-1969) was born in Kassouth County, Iowa, where he attended rural school. He graduated from Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, Minnesota, in 1913. After graduation he accepted a position as teacher in the Wheaton High School. He moved to Hatton, North Dakota, where he served as superintendent of schools. Later he returned to Wheaton where he acted as superintendent for twenty-seven years, retiring in 1950.

Mr. Pearson will be remembered by the many students as a teacher of the "old school". He strove for high academic standards and good discipline in his school. The Wheaton community honored him in

1953 by naming the new grade-school building the "J. E. Pearson Elementary School."

The best tribute to Mr. Pearson as an educator was one written by his son, Dr. Neville Pearson, in the **Audio Visual Journal** of the University of Minnesota from which the following excerpts are quoted:

"When I think of my good teachers, I think of my father. Like many children of teachers, I faced my father both at home and in the classroom. Dad was superintendent of schools for 27 years in Wheaton, Minnesota.

"During those years the superintendent in most smaller schools not only had to administer the schools and all their various activities — he also had to teach. My father taught senior social studies. He was feared and respected by all his students. He was innovative. He used programmed material back in the 1930's. He used team teaching.



Les Murray, a man who dedicated his entire adult life to working with and teaching the young, was an elementary teacher in Wheaton for 16 years and a favorite of students. Following his retirement he served as a substitute teacher for a number of years. He spent more than 50 years in teaching.

He never was tied to one text (much to the regret of his students who had to search in half a dozen books).

"Wheaton also had one of the 16mm cameras used to record school activities. In recent years these old films have brought memories back at class reunions.

"I would like to pay public tribute to one of the best teachers I ever had. A perfectionist to the last, he chided me about spelling errors and my less than perfect penmanship. My father affected my life, but as a professional educator in the school where I was trained, he helped me and thousands of other students across the years to establish patterns and set standards as a model for teaching.

"Teachers do teach as they were taught, and I am thankful to have had my father as a classroom teacher."

Besides being a dedicated teacher, in his retirement years Mr. Pearson served his community as clerk of the Village of Wheaton and as deputy registrar of motor vehicles in Traverse County. He served his church as lay pastor and filled many of the church offices.

+ + +

Lester Murray (1908-1983) was one who dedicated most of his life to children. He was born in White Rock, South Dakota, in 1908 and spent his early years there. He graduated from high school and attended college at Mitchell, South Dakota, later graduating from Bemidji State College.

Part of Murray's life was devoted to working with the Indians on reservations. In the 1940's he worked with the Indians in what was known as the Lower Sioux Reservation in Redwood County, Minnesota. Both he and his wife were adopted into the Sioux Tribe and received Indian names. Later he taught school at the White Earth Reservation near Ponsford, Minnesota. Because he was not allowed to help the Indian outside the classroom, he felt he could no longer stay there.

From there he came to Wheaton and taught in a rural school for three years. Then he began teaching in the Wheaton school system. He taught a total of fifty-one and a half years.


Many will remember Mr. Murray as a dedicated teacher and Boy Scout leader. He played the role of Santa Claus for children of the community for thirty-three years. In January, 1983, a tragic accident ended his life.

Charles M. Roberg (1861-1940) was a man who gave twenty-five years of his life to maintaining the Wheaton School property.

Few custodians at schools live on in the memory of students. But at Wheaton High Charley Roberg did. He was a favorite of students for 25 years, and even became the subject of poetry by one of the elementary teachers when he died in 1940.

"Charley" was born in Sweden where he studied steam engineering. He and his family came directly to Wheaton in 1902, and he was employed at a local blacksmith shop. He became the school custodian in 1914, holding the job until his death in 1940.

At the memorial service in the auditorium on January 3, 1940, school board members, students, and faculty all gave tribute to Charley's cheerfulness, his kindness to students, his understanding of their problems and his interest in their activities. Since he lived in the school, he was on duty day and night. No play or program was complete without Charley to handle the lighting and the curtain.

A poem "In Memory" written by Evelyn (Green) Boehmlehner, a teacher of the Wheaton school, is a tribute to "Charley":

**Charley, a janitor at old Wheaton High,
With a smile on his face and a twinkle
in his eye,**

**Small in stature, but a heart of gold,
Warmly greeted kids, coming in from
the cold.**

**Kind and generous and full of joy,
Had special respect from each girl
and boy,**

**Who, now in memory want to tell
How they loved the little man who rang
the big bell.**

A building that has served the Wheaton school district faithfully for the past seventy-five years has become the victim of progress. The 1899 portion of the former Wheaton high school building has been torn down to make room for a new city hall.

With the new high school building ready for use, the part of the old building which remained following the fire of April 1, 1972 was no longer needed.

On Tuesday, Aug. 20 a crew moved in to start the destruction of the building and the Gazette cameraman was on the spot to record the progress of the project.

Picture No. 1 shows the start of the tearing down process. The


huge crane revolved on, knicked a getting hole in the roof, then bit by bit, the building came down into a heap of rubble.

Picture No. 2 shows the bell being hoisted out of its tower. From then on the destruction proceeded on rapidly as trucks hauled out the debris as soon as it came down.



The final result is shown in Picture No. 13. The lot has been completely cleared and leveled off. The only remains of the old Wheaton high school building now is the newer portion on the south end of the lot which housed the industrial arts shop and the band room.

It took the crew about a week to complete their project.





Summer School at Wheaton High in 1901 shows staff and students. Unlike regular high school, which ran only nine months, Wheaton had a “Normal School” which ran the year-around. High school graduates would attend from throughout a wide area to receive training so that they could become elementary school teachers. Note that the vast majority of the students in the Normal School were young ladies. Seated in the front row are faculty members for the summer session.



Interstate Hospital, the first hospital to serve the Wheaton community, opened August 15, 1898, on a tract of land just east of where the First Presbyterian Church is located today. Note the total absence of either trees or other buildings in the area. On the porch of the building is one of the staff. Only graduate nurses were employed.
